Course description: In the lecture/ seminar we examine patterns of innovation and economic performance in contemporary political economies. The Varieties of Capitalism approach is used as a framework of analysis. We will discuss the theoretical implications of this approach as well as its explanatory power with respect to empirical cases.
